LMC ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2017

The LMC conference 2017 took place in Edinburgh on Thursday 18 and Friday 19 May 2017.

The annual two-day Local Medical Committees (LMCs) conference was an opportunity for representatives to create policy for future General Practitioners Committee (GPC) and BMA action for the following year.

Many of the issues raised by Leeds LMC and put forward as motions for debate were contained within the agenda and supported by other LMCs from around the country. Leeds LMC vice-chair, Dr Nicola Hambridge, successfully proposed a motion highlighting the serious problems with the service provided by Primary Care Support England (Capita) and called for urgent improvements to be made.

SERVICE CHARGES ISSUES – NHS PROPERTY SERVICES AND COMMUNITY HEALTH PARTNERSHIP PREMISES

The BMA GP Committee (GPC) is working to resolve issues that practices in NHS Property Services and Community Health Partnerships premises are experiencing with regards to service charges. This is an issue that we know is of utmost importance to those practices occupying NHSPS or CHP owned premises and is therefore of utmost importance to the BMA. While they hope to reach a negotiated agreement on these issues, they are considering all options to ensure this issue is addressed swiftly and the resolution is fair and reasonable for practices.

Please find attached to this edition of Viewpoint a letter and questionnaire to practices in NHS PS premises, a letter and questionnaire to practices in CHP premises and a list of premises owned by NHS PS and/or CHP in Leeds. The BMA are aware of the destabilising effect the issue of service charges is causing to many practices. Through the questionnaire, they are looking for information from practices on the issues, and we would encourage affected practices to fill out the questionnaire, and return it by 23 June 2017. ONLINE RESEARCH - GP & NURSES VIEWS ON QUESTIONNAIRES TO IDENTIFY DEPRESSION

Kate McLintock, GP Lecturer in Primary Care (Leeds Institute of Health Sciences), would like to invite GPs to take part in on line research which aims to understand what GPs and nurses working in NHS general practice think about the use of simple questionnaires to identify depression. You will be aware that NICE recommend we undertake case finding for depression in patients with long-term physical conditions, and that case finding for depression in those with diagnoses of diabetes and/or heart disease was incentivised by QOF until 2013. There has been lots of disagreement about the value of this approach and she would be interested in your views. All data used in this project will be anonymised.

By taking part you will contribute to understanding whether case finding could be more effectively implemented and incorporated in to primary care.

Relevant ethical approval for this research has been granted (IRAS Project ID: 219797 REC reference number: 11/EM/0144). A £20 eVoucher will be offered to those who complete the survey.

END-OF-LIFE CARE AND PHYSICIAN-ASSISTED DYING PROJECT

Throughout 2015 the BMA undertook a major project seeking the views from members and the public on their experiences, views, and perceptions on end-of-life care and some aspects of physician-assisted dying. With a specialist social research agency, they held 21 dialogue events across the UK and engaged with over 500 doctors and members of the public.

After reviewing the findings and liaising with a variety of organisations they came up with a series of recommendations around end-of-life care. A leaflet setting out the key recommendations can be found here. Some of the recommendations are directed at healthcare providers, and some of these are in areas where some simple changes could have a significant impact. We have been asked to promote awareness of this work, and the recommendations, amongst GPs and commissioners.

Emotional support for doctors

One significant finding was the emotional toll that caring for patients at the end of life can have on doctors and the lack of emotional support available to them in many parts of the country. The project followed up on this work by asking questions relating to the impact on doctors of caring for dying patients in the regular on-line survey of 2,500 BMA members. They found that:

- nearly 70% of respondents sometimes felt that caring for patients at the end of life had an emotional impact on them personally and 25% were always affected
 - of those affected emotionally, only 15% had accessed formal or informal support networks locally or nationally
 - only 18% felt there was sufficient support available to doctors caring for dying patients.

One of the respondents summed up concerns by saying "I don't think we spend time thinking about the emotional impact, so we bottle it up then burn out." We all want to avoid this. This means putting systems in place but also removing the stigma attached to seeking help, so that staff are encouraged to seek help and support at an early stage, before these stresses begin to have a negative impact on their health and their ability to care for patients.

Many of the doctors referred to local mechanisms that were inexpensive to put in place but had a significant impact on staff well-being and we are encouraging others to consider the services in place locally and how these can be improved. There is also a role for national services, such as the BMA's counselling and doctor advisor service which is accessible, free of charge, to all doctors. REMINDER – GUIDANCE FROM PUBLIC HEALTH ENGLAND ON ADVICE FOR GPs ON MYCOBACTERIUM CHIMAERA INFECTIONS ASSOCIATE WITH CARDIOPULMONARY BYPASS

Some GPs may have not seen the letter which provides guidance from Public Health England on advice for GPs on *Mycobacterium chimaera* infections associated with cardiopulmonary bypass. This remains a national issue, raised last year, about risk of infections in patients that have been on cardiac bypass machines (some risk of infection from the heater coolers used). Patients are being asked to see their GPs if thought to be at risk. We have attached a copy of the guidance again.

CYBER ATTACK UPDATE - NEED FOR UP TO DATE OUT OF HOURS GP CONTACT LIST

The impact of the recent cyber-attack that hit many other areas of the NHS was fortunately very limited in Leeds. Devices with Windows 7 or 10 appeared to escape the virus and software had been regularly updated. The LMC have fed back comments received from practices about the good communications from CCGs to practices. All Leeds practices should ensure they produce an up to date out-of-hours GP contact list for the CCG to ensure we are prepared should another incident take place in the future.

LEEDS PRIMARY CARE NEWS - GUIDELINE TO TREATING GONORRHOEA

In view of the difficulties many patients experience accessing the integrated sexual health clinic for treatment of gonorrhoea some patients may be seen in GP surgeries and request treatment.

Please see attached to this version of Viewpoint a copy of the full Draft Primary Care Guideline for Treatment of Gonorrhoea. The guidance covers this helpful section below:

It is expected that the majority of patients with suspected gonorrhoea will be referred to the new Leeds Sexual Health Service for full management including access to IM Ceftriaxone which is available at all hubs and spokes of the new service. Outside LSHS hours, the patients can be seen in the Acute Gynaecology Assessment Unit on Ward 24 at St James's. SECONDARY CARE PROVIDER INCIDENT AND QUERY REPORTING

Following the changes to the hospital standard contract many practices have been using the BMA template letters to highlight to hospital colleagues when work is being inappropriately transferred to practices and could be better dealt with through improved hospital systems. Following discussions with CCGs, they have now put in place a system for practices to use to report incidents, which includes other methods of reporting provider queries to the CCGs and not just the breach templates. This has already been circulated in the Leeds CCGs citywide bulletin and a copy has been attached to this edition on Viewpoint. Please send any queries you may have to us at mail@leedslmc.org.
